Milo church restoration underway

When the United Methodist Church in Milo was built in 1911, it's a good bet that its parishioners never envisioned that a fire would threaten it 99 years later.

On a Sunday afternoon on June 21, 2009, after parishioners had finished their morning services, wiring to a light fixture hanging in the sanctuary sparked a fire in the attic. Passing motorists noticed the fire and several people salvaged what they could from the church and food pantry before firefighters deemed

entry unsafe. The church, located near the fire department, was heavily damaged but the quick response from the fire department is credited with saving the structure. The steeple's small historic stained glass window was destroyed as well the entire newly shingled roof of the main church due to the tremendous amount of heat from the fire.

The day after the fire, Rev. Michele St. Cyr, presiding minister, called Paul Davis Restoration, a division of Keith Trembley Builder.

















Crews took the first steps in the anticipated 8-month process to restore the building for use. The pews and alter were removed; tin that covered the walls and ceiling was also removed. To reach the 21-foot-high ceiling, scaffolding was installed. All the hand crafted trim was removed and delivered to Paul Bunyan Lumber in Bangor, where owner Maurice Cyr, a millwork specialist, will be duplicating the trim.

Once the these steps were completed, restoration began. Several trusses were replaced and the roof repaired. The entire attic area was scraped, sealed and primed. Steps yet to be accomplish include replacing all the tin on the walls and ceilings, installing new flooring and wainscoting.
